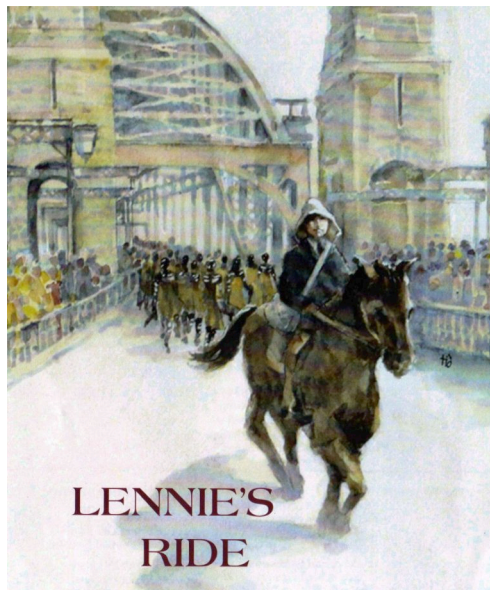

Lennie's Ride The launch of the book *Lennie's Ride* by Mary Small was *magic* according to our president Jennifer Hamilton. There was a good crowd including Gwyther family members and those present enjoyed the afternoon. Lennie Gwyther was nine years old when he rode his pony "Ginger Mick" from Leongatha to Sydney for the opening of the Sydney Harbour Bridge in 1932. His story is beautifully told by Mary Small and illustrated by Marion Wilcocks. The book is designed for children but it is a wonderful read for any age. *Lennie's Ride* is available from our Society and costs \$15. 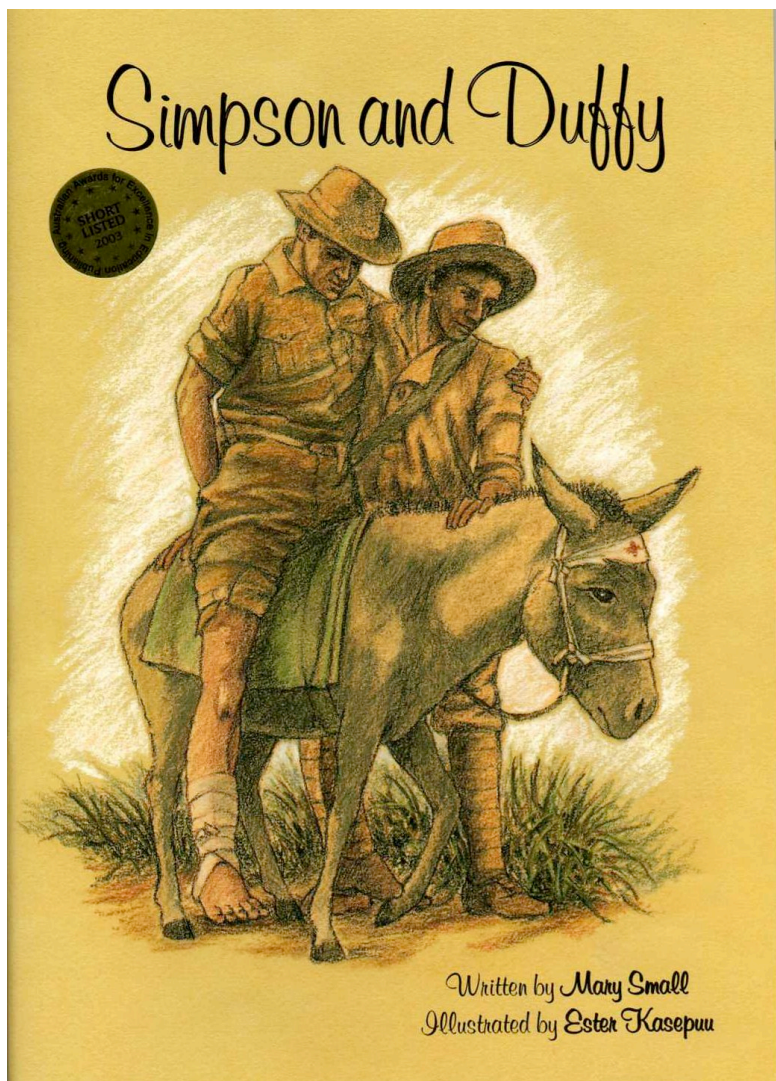

Books by Mary Small

It was delightful to receive copies of Mary's wonderful Anzac Committee books and I read them with great interest. I was especially taken with *The Unknown Australian Soldier* because I saw in this book a way to tell stories about our country's history that need to be told. As a writer of articles about Australians at War, I was moved by a story in which the ghost of the Unknown Soldier takes two children on a journey to see what World War One was all about. The writing is so clear, the words so well chosen. The story is also beautifully illustrated with the Unknown Soldier and the children shown as on lookers watching the dreadful scenes below. The scenes are photographs in black and white and the drawings include the soldier and the children in colour. The book is a gem and would be a great gift for any child. I read about Simpson and his donkey Duffy. I thought I knew this story but Mary's book taught me more. Duffy was named and given more credit for his work. The Indian army mule handlers were also mentioned. How many people know that there were Indian troops and Indian mule teams at Gallipoli? The other two books are, *Feathered Soldiers*, about the pigeons that served in World War Two and *Seek* about the dogs that served in Vietnam.

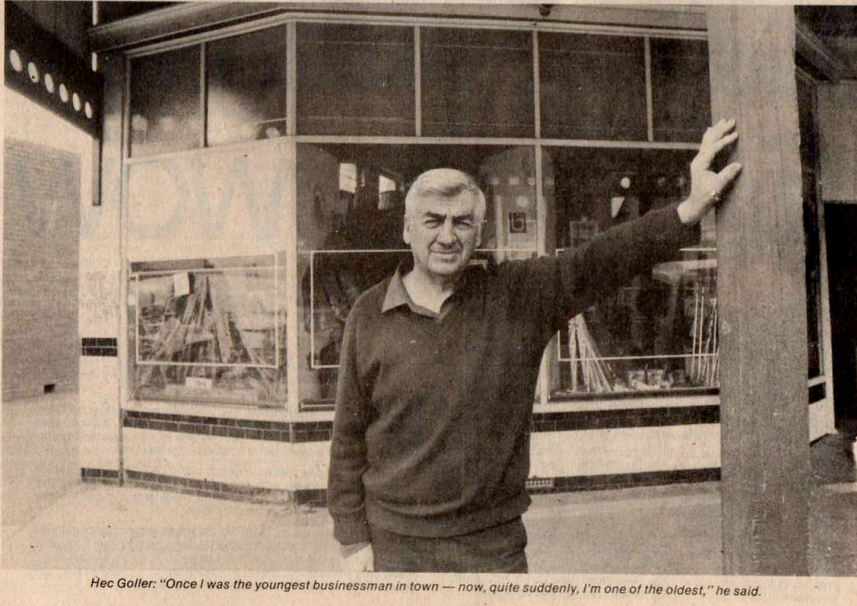

Koorooman East Avenue of Honour

Ian Lester organised a public meeting to consider the restoration and recognition of the Koorooman East Avenue of Honour. There are two rows of large trees, one along the side of the road and one in a paddock and the trees are in good condition. The trees need some work done on them and signs to indicate the location of the avenue need to be placed in the area. There is an honour board in the historical society from Koorooman East and therefore we know the names of those men who served in the Great War and for whom the trees were planted. A plaque listing the names of the men is also needed. Other meetings have been organised by Ian and he is being assisted by David Shambrock, who has a relative named on the honour board. Steve Misson from the Shire is looking into land ownership and the possibility of Shire funds being made available. Grants are available from Veterans Affairs for some of the project also. The wheels are turning.

Hec Goller is shown standing in front of his sporting goods shop in McCartin Street in the 1980s. Hec's father, Harris Goller came to Leongatha after World War One. He had been a Saddler Sergeant in the Light Horse. Harris ran a saddlery and sports store just up the street from where he built Goller's Store in 1929 on the corner of what is now called Goller's Lane. Hec ran the business until he retired and the store is now a florist
