The Search for Charlotte Swindell by Lyn Skillern

It is amazing where a simple request can lead. Some months ago we received an email from a Sue Dahlke who was looking into the story of two relations Charlotte and Ann Swindell. Sue wanted to know why her relation Charlotte was buried in Leongatha cemetery with Jane Forrest. Jane Forrest died in 1907 and Charlotte in 1954. These two woman were not related. We could only give her the information that Charlotte had been the house keeper for Jane Forrest's son Robert who owned the property at Wooreen currently owned by David Thompson. Sue was able to find out more. Charlotte received an equal share of the estate of Jane Forrest with her children. It seems there was some connection between Jane and Charlotte who may have been brought up by Jane after her mother's death in 1870. Charlotte was around 5 at the time her mother died. When Robert Forrest died he left the farm to Charlotte Swindell and it was run by her niece Myrtle Aleinde and her husband Tony. The farm became the property the Aleindi family and Ron Aleindi, the son of Myrtle and Tony, sold it to the Thompsons. Myrtle was the daughter of Ann Elizabeth Swindell who married a Wilson. When the Society received the request from Sue the only thing we had in our files with the name Swindell was a shawl brought out from England in 1854 by a Nellie Swindell (Charlotte's mother). After a lot of confusion re Nellie and Charlotte and more research by Sue the story fell into place.

The shawl was given to the Society by Hilda Tilson, who received it from Myrtle Aleindi. A chat with Hilda revealed more. After leaving the farm to be run by her son Ron, Myrtle Aleindi lived in McCartin St Leongatha over the road from Hilda Tilson and they were very good friends. Ron Aleindi and his wife sold the farm and went to Tathra to run a motel. Myrtle and Hilda's mother went with them. After a short time Hilda brought her mother back to Leongatha. According to Myrtle a Mrs Batty made the shawl for Nellie Swindell who in turn brought it to Australia. Sue does not know who Mrs Batty was. Pat Spinks did remember playing tennis against Ron Aleindi in the 1950's but did not know what happened to him until Hilda filled us in.

As a result of much research and the discussions with Sue Dahlke we now have some very nice photographs and copies of the wills of Robert and Jane Forrest. The Forrest family were quite well off and had a property at Rosedale as well. Tony Aleindi who lived in the Mt Eccles area worked for Robert Forrest and went to the Rosedale property often. He may have met Myrtle on his trips to Rosedale or even when Tony was ill in Sale Hospital. One can piece together an interesting, and hopefully true story if you have the basic information to start the search. Birth and death records, wills, cemetery records, diaries, photographs and artefacts (well labelled) all played a part in this search.
